PUBLIC NOTICE

FLINT CITY COUNCIL ELECTRONIC PUBLIC MEETING

On Friday, October 5, 2020, the Michigan Supreme Court (MSC) issued an order declaring that the Emergency Powers of Governor (EPG) Act as an unconstitutional delegation of legislative authority, which was the primary authority relied on by Governor Whitmer for her COVID-19 related executive orders. Subsequently, Governor Whitmer requested that the MSC clarify that their order does not go into effect until October 30, 2020. On Monday October 12, 2020, the Michigan Supreme Court rejected Governor Whitmer's request to delay the effect of its decision to strike down the EPG. On, Tuesday, October 13, 2020, Senate Bill 1108 passed, amending the Open Meetings Act to allow municipalities to hold electronic meetings. On Friday, October 16, 2020, Governor Whitmer signed into law Senate Bill 1108 amending the Open Meetings Act. Subsequently, on December 22, 2020, Public Act 267 of 1976 was amended through Senate Bill 1246 extending the electronic meetings with no reason through March 31, 2021. The act also allows that after March 31, 2021, electronic meetings may be held if a local state of emergency was declared. On March 23, 2020, the Flint City Council extended Mayor Neeley's declaration of emergency indefinitely due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Therefore, this meeting will be held electronically.

Pursuant to Act 267 of the Public Acts of 1976 Open Meetings Act as amended and Flint City Charter Section 3-202, notice is hereby given that the Flint City Council hereby calls for Regular Meetings of the Flint City Council scheduled to be held as follows:

Allocations in the Self-Insurance Fund will be reviewed and increased to offset the costs and remove the fund deficit. Reimbursements will be made from the city's funds relative to their expenses in the Self-Insurance Fund.]

210326 Budget Amendment/Transfer of Funds/General Fund/Police

Notice of Intent/Declaring Intent to Reimburse

- 1. The City Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to publish a notice of intent to issue the Bonds in The Flint Journal, a newspaper of general circulation in the City.
- 2. The notice of intent shall be published as a display advertisement not less than one-quarter (1/4) page in size in substantially the form attached to this resolution as Exhibit A.
- 3. The City Council does hereby determine that the foregoing form of Notice of Intent to Issue Bonds, and the manner of publication directed, is adequate notice to the electors of the City and users of the System, and is the method best calculated to give them notice of the City's intent to issue the Bonds, the purpose of the Bonds, the security for the Bonds, and the right of referendum of the electors with respect thereto, and the newspaper named for publication is hereby determined to reach the largest number of persons to whom the notice is directed.
- 4. The City makes the following declarations for the purpose of complying with the reimbursement rules of Treas. Reg. § 1.150-2 pursuant to the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended:
- (a) As of the date hereof, the City reasonably expects to reimburse the City for the expenditures described in (b) below with proceeds of debt to be incurred by the City.
- (b) The expenditures described in this paragraph (b) are for the costs of acquiring and constructing the Project, which were or will be paid subsequent to sixty (60) days prior to the date hereof.
- (c) The maximum principal amount of debt expected to be issued for the Project, including issuance costs, is \$46,000,000.

- 5. The Mayor, City Clerk, Finance Director and City Treasurer of the City are each authorized to act as an authorized officer or designated representative in connection with the Project and execute and deliver such applications, documents or certificates with EGLE, the MFA or other entities as may be necessary or advisable to enable the City to issue and sell the Bonds as contemplated herein and to meet its obligations under the CWRF loan program.
- 6. The City hereby confirms the retention of PFM Financial Advisors LLC ("PFM") to provide financial advisory services in connection with the Bonds. The City has been advised that PFM has represented the MFA in the past and may be representing the MFA presently in connection with various matters, including the CWRF loan program, and the City consents to the representation of the MFA by PFM in connection with the CWRF loan program that may be utilized by the City in connection with the Bonds.
- 7. All resolutions and parts of resolutions insofar as they conflict with the provisions of this resolution be and the same hereby are rescinded.

RESOLUTION TO SPYGLASS FOR TECHNOLOGY EXPENSE MANAGEMENT CONSULTING

WHEREAS, the Information Systems division agreed to an audit of the City's primary telecommunications service accounts to seek cost recovery, service elimination, and cost reduction recommendations. Per the audit agreement, fees are applicable only for those recommendations the City chooses to implement. The applicable fees for recommendations implemented is 50% of any cost recovery and 12 months of any service elimination or cost reduction savings.

The initial audit revealed \$846,105.24 of potential annual savings. Phase 1 investigation, coordinated between SpyGlass and the Information Systems division, has identified \$571,570.56 of immediately actionable savings. Further research is needed to verify the remaining potential savings.

The Information Systems division recommends The SpyGlass Group LLC, 25777 Detroit Road, Suite 400, Westlake, OH 44145, be awarded the bid for technology expense management consulting in an amount not to exceed \$846,105.24, dependent on realized savings, for FY2022.

SpyGlass Snapshot Audit Agreement

This agreement, effective as of the later of the dates of signature below ("Effective Date"), is between City of Flint, Michigan ("Company"), and The SpyGlass Group, LLC, an Ohio limited liability company ("Auditor").

1. Primary Audit Services. Company is engaging Auditor as an independent contractor to analyze its primary telecommunications service accounts (Voice, Data, Internet, Cloud Services and Mobility/Cellular) to seek cost recovery, service elimination and cost reduction recommendations. Company will provide Auditor with the materials required to perform its analysis and Auditor will conduct a Kickoff meeting with Company to review the materials provided and introduce Auditor's personnel assigned to the project. Auditor will deliver the recommendations to Company at a Summary of Findings meeting, implement recommendations that Company elects for Auditor to implement, and deliver a complete telecommunications inventory to Company.

While Auditor is performing its analysis, Company will not make changes or perform internal cost reduction analysis with respect to provider accounts which Company has included within the scope of Auditor's review.

- 2. Fees. Company will pay Auditor the applicable fee set forth below ONLY for Auditor recommendations implemented within twelve (12) months of Auditor delivering the recommendation to Company:
 - 50% of any "Cost Recovery", as defined below
 - · 12 times any "Service Elimination Savings", as defined below
 - 12 times any "Cost Reduction Savings", as defined below

Notwithstanding anything else herein to the contrary, Company and Auditor agree that any elected recommendations resulting in Auditor fees \$75,000 and under shall be paid in accordance with Section 3 of this Agreement. Any recommendations resulting in Auditor fees that exceed \$75,000 shall be subject to City Council approval.

"Cost Recovery" is any refund, credit or compensation received by Company relating to past services or charges.

"Service Elimination Savings" is any monthly cost reduction received by Company relating to cancellation of any service, including monthly usage cost reduction (calculated as the average of the last 2 months of usage costs associated with the cancelled service).

"Cost Reduction Savings" is any monthly cost reduction received by Company relating to the modification, consolidation or negotiation of any service, account or contract, including post discount usage rate improvement (calculated as the (a) decrease in post discount per unit pricing realized by Company for any service, times (b) the average of Company's last two (2) months usage levels measured in such units for the modified service).

- 3. Involcing and Payment. Fees for Cost Recovery are due as a one-time payment within 30 days of verification that Company has been issued the refund, credit or compensation resulting in such fees. However, fees for Service Elimination Savings and Cost Reduction Savings are due in two (2) installments, the first of which is due within thirty (30) days after verification that the cancellation or other activity resulting in the Service Elimination Savings or Cost Reduction Savings has been completed, and the second of which is due within thirty (30) days after July 1, 2021. The amount of the first installment will be equal to the amount of Service Elimination Savings or Cost Reduction Savings, as applicable, that Company will realize after implementation through June 30, 2021. The amount of the second installment will be equal to the remainder of fees owed to Auditor as calculated under this Agreement. In no event, will both installments together be greater than 12 times the Service Elimination Savings and Cost Reduction Savings as provided for in Section 2 hereof.
- 4. Confidential Information. Auditor shall keep confidential and shall not divulge to any other person or entity who is not a director, officer or employee of Company, during the term of this Agreement or thereafter, any of the business secrets or other confidential information regarding Company which information has been received or become known to Auditor in the course of its consulting services hereunder and which has not otherwise become public knowledge; provided, however, that nothing in this Agreement shall preclude Auditor from disclosing information (a) to parties retained to perform services for Company, or (b) as may be required by law, including the Michigan Freedom of Information Act. Company shall keep confidential and shall not divulge to any other person or entity who is not a director, officer or employee of Auditor, during the term of this Agreement or thereafter, any of the business secrets or other confidential information regarding Auditor which has not otherwise become public knowledge including, without limitation, Auditor's consulting services pricing structure, method of performing such consulting services and any of the details of this Agreement; provided, however, that nothing in this Agreement shall preclude Company from disclosing information as may be required by law including the Michigan Freedom of Information Act.
- 5. Miscellaneous. This agreement is governed by the laws of the State of Michigan, without regard to principles of conflicts of law and may be executed by facsimile and simultaneously in multiple counterparts. Company agrees that Auditor does not warranty the overall performance, Company satisfaction, or data accuracy of any telecommunications related carrier, provider, software manufacturer or vendor at any time whatsoever during or after the term of this agreement. Each person signing this agreement on behalf of a party represents that he or she has been duly authorized to sign this agreement and to bind the party on whose behalf this agreement is being signed by that signatory. NEITHER PARTY SHALL BE LIABLE TO THE OTHER FOR INCIDENTAL, CONSEQUENTIAL, SPECIAL OR PUNITIVE DAMAGES, INCLUDING, WITHOUT LIMITATION, LOST PROFITS OR BUSINESS INTERRUPTION, WHETHER SUCH LIABILITY IS ASSERTED ON THE BASIS OF CONTRACT, TORT OR OTHERWISE, EVEN IF EITHER PARTY HAS BEEN WARNED OF THE POSSIBILITY OF ANY SUCH LOSS OR DAMAGE IN ADVANCE. THE PRIOR

SENTENCE SHALL NOT IN ANY WAY LIMIT AUDITOR'S LIABILITY TO THE COMPANY FOR DIRECT DAMAGES RELATED TO AUDITOR'S NEGLIGENT RECOMMENDATIONS OR NEGLIGENT WORK IN PERFORMING THIS ENGAGEMENT.

The following preamble and resolution were offered by the Administration:

WHEREAS, the City of Flint, County of Genesee, State of Michigan (the "City"), has determined that it is necessary for the public health, safety and welfare of the City to acquire, construct, furnish and equip improvements to the City's existing Sewage Disposal System (the "System"), including water pollution control facilities, pump station improvements, aeration process modifications and improvements, waste unloading station, disinfection retrofit, grit removal, influent box, sewer bypass, and sludge dewatering improvements, together with all related appurtenances and attachments thereto (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the City has been advised by the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy ("EGLE"), that financial assistance to accomplish the acquisition and construction of the Project is available through the Clean Water Revolving Fund ("CWRF") Loan Program administered by EGLE and the Michigan Finance Authority (the "MFA"); and

WHEREAS, the Revenue Bond Act, Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended ("Act 94"), provides a means for financing the purchase, acquisition, construction, improvement, enlargement, extension, and repair of public improvements such as the Project through the issuance of revenue bonds; and

WHEREAS, the issuance of bonds payable from revenues of the System under Act 94 in a total amount not to exceed Forty-Six Million Dollars (\$46,000,000.00) (the "Bonds") for the purpose of financing all or part of the Project represents the most practical means to that end; and

WHEREAS, the City has made application for participation in the CWRF loan program; and

WHEREAS, a notice of intent to issue revenue bonds must be published before the issuance of the Bonds in order to comply with the requirements of Section 33 of Act 94; and

WHEREAS, the City intends at this time to state its intentions to be reimbursed from proceeds of the Bonds for any expenditures undertaken by the City for the Project prior to issuance of the Bonds.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. The City Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to publish a notice of intent to issue the Bonds in *The Flint Journal*, a newspaper of general circulation in the City.
- 2. The notice of intent shall be published as a display advertisement not less than one-quarter (1/4) page in size in substantially the form attached to this resolution as Exhibit A.
- 3. The City Council does hereby determine that the foregoing form of Notice of Intent to Issue Bonds, and the manner of publication directed, is adequate notice to the electors of the City and users of the System, and is the method best calculated to give them notice of the City's intent to issue the Bonds, the purpose of the Bonds, the security for the Bonds, and the right of referendum of the electors with respect thereto, and the newspaper named for publication is hereby determined to reach the largest number of persons to whom the notice is directed.
- 4. The City makes the following declarations for the purpose of complying with the reimbursement rules of Treas. Reg. § 1.150-2 pursuant to the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended:
 - (a) As of the date hereof, the City reasonably expects to reimburse the City for the expenditures described in (b) below with proceeds of debt to be incurred by the City.
 - (b) The expenditures described in this paragraph (b) are for the costs of acquiring and constructing the Project which were or will be paid subsequent to sixty (60) days prior to the date hereof.
 - (c) The maximum principal amount of debt expected to be issued for the Project, including issuance costs, is \$46,000,000.00.
- 5. The Mayor, City Clerk, Finance Director and City Treasurer of the City are each authorized to act as an authorized officer or designated representative in connection with the Project and execute and deliver such applications, documents or certificates with EGLE, the MFA or other entities as may be necessary or advisable to enable the City to issue and sell the Bonds as contemplated herein and to meet its obligations under the CWRF loan program.
- 6. The City hereby confirms the retention of PFM Financial Advisors LLC ("PFM") to provide financial advisory services in connection with the Bonds. The City has been advised that PFM has represented the MFA in the past and may be representing the MFA presently in connection with various matters including the CWRF loan program and the City consents to the representation of the MFA by PFM in connection with the CWRF loan program that may be utilized by the City in connection with the Bonds.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS AND ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF FLINT AND TO USERS OF THE CITY'S SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM OF INTENT TO ISSUE REVENUE BONDS AND THE RIGHT OF REFERENDUM RELATING THERETO

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the City Council of the City of Flint, County of Genesee, State of Michigan (the "City"), intends to issue and sell revenue bonds pursuant to Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended, in one or more series in a total amount not to exceed Forty-Six Million Dollars (\$46,000,000.00), for the purpose of paying all or part of the cost to acquire, construct, furnish and equip improvements to the City's existing Sewage Disposal System, including water pollution control facilities, pump station improvements, aeration process modifications and improvements, waste unloading station, disinfection retrofit, grit removal, influent box, sewer bypass, and sludge dewatering improvements, together with all related appurtenances and attachments thereto.

SOURCE OF PAYMENT OF REVENUE BONDS

THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON THE REVENUE BONDS SHALL BE PAYABLE solely from the revenues received by the City from the operations of the Sewage Disposal System (the "System"). The revenues will consist of rates and charges billed to the users of the System, a schedule of which is presently on file in the office of the City Clerk. The rates and charges may from time to time be revised to provide sufficient revenues to provide for the expenses of operating and maintaining the System, to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and to pay other obligations of the System.

BOND DETAILS

THE REVENUE BONDS will be payable in annual installments not to exceed thirty (30) in number and will bear interest at the rate or rates to be determined at public or private sale but in no event to exceed such rates as may be permitted by law on the unpaid balance from time to time remaining outstanding on said bonds.

IN THE EVENT THAT THE CITY DEEMS IT DESIRABLE TO SELL THE REVENUE BONDS TO THE MICHIGAN FINANCE AUTHORITY, THE CITY MAY BE REQUIRED TO PLEDGE FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE BONDS MONEY RECEIVED OR TO BE RECEIVED BY THE CITY DERIVED FROM IMPOSITION OF TAXES BY THE STATE AND RETURNED OR TO BE RETURNED TO THE CITY AS PROVIDED BY LAW, except for money the use of which is prohibited for such purposes by the State Constitution. The City may enter into an agreement providing for the payment of taxes, which taxes are collected by the State and returned to the City as provided by law, to the authority or a trustee, and such funds may be pledged for the payment of the revenue bonds.

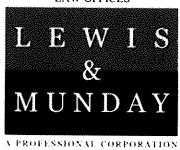
RIGHT OF REFERENDUM

Re: Flint CWRF 2021 - Resolution Authorizing the Notice of Intent to Issue Bonds

Dear Members of City Council:

The attached resolution would authorize the publication of a notice of the City's intent to issue bonds to finance the next phase of sewer system improvements that began last year. The notice initiates a 45-day referendum period during which electors have a right to petition for a vote on the matter. The Notice is the same in all material respects as the notice adopted and published for Phase I of the sewer improvement project. As a point of reference, the 2020 notice was in the amount of \$40 million for Phase I, which was estimated at \$31 million prior to construction bids being received. \$35.4 million of bonds were eventually issued, but because of 20% State grant funds, the amount of bonds to be repaid has been reduced to \$28.3 million. The interest rate on the 30-year loan was 2.25%.

It is important to note that although the loan amount to be repaid has been reduced to \$28.3 million, the City still had to issue \$35.4 million of bonds because the loan forgiveness is not applied until after the bond issue closing. That is why the notice of intent and approved bond amount do not reflect the value of the state grant.

The next phase of the sewer project will include improvements to the Third Avenue Pumping Station, settling tanks, clarifiers and grit removal systems. The current project estimate is \$35.1 million, and construction bids have not been received yet. If this project is financed by September 29, 2021, a State grant of 25% of the cost is expected which would amount to about \$8.8 million that would be forgiven and not have to be repaid. The interest rate this year is 2.125%.

The attached Notice of Intent resolution reflects a not-to-exceed amount of bonds at \$46 million. This amount is approximately 30% in excess of the current project budget. This buffer is provided because construction bids have not been received yet, and many utility projects have been experiencing bids

coming in over estimate due to supply chain issues and the sheer volume of work in process. Bids for the project are expected next week but may take some time to analyze.

Also, concerning the amount published in the Notice, the project still needs to come back to City Council for final approval with consideration of the bond authorizing resolution. That will likely occur sometime in August. At that point, all project bids will be in hand and have been analyzed. And even then, the authority of the City to issue the bonds will be further limited by the final loan amount approved by the State.

Timing is critical for this action because if the loan does not close by September 29, the project will shift to the State's next fiscal year and funding availability (including the 25% State grant) cannot be confirmed.

PROJECTS CURRENTLY IN DESIGN - PHASE 2

Third Avenue Pumping Station Improvements

Work at the pump station that is needed includes building upgrades, mechanical and HVAC, electrical, process valves and piping, structural, and low flow pumping capability. Each raw sewage pump at the pump station is equipped with a variable frequency drive (VFD) but cannot turn down to a pumping rate for the station's low flow events. Each of the 4 pumps has a capacity of 25,000 gpm. This leads to operating the pump beyond a recommended point or starting and stopping the pump too frequently. Dry weather flows which exist outside the raw sewage pumps operating range can be handled using one or two smaller rated pumps. This configuration would increase the longevity of the existing raw sewage pumps. These improvements, especially the additional dry rated pumps and isolation valves, would best be completed prior to replacing/rehabilitating the force mains so bypass pumping can be minimized or avoided.

Primary Settling Tanks Improvements

Improvements to the primary clarification tanks will include replacing the mechanism drives, longitudinal and cross flights for sludge conveyance, and the effluent weirs. These upgrades will promote a more reliable clarification system and will help prevent solids carry over to the secondary treatment. Concrete degradation will also be addressed and repaired.

Final Clarifier Improvements

The project will address the holes present in all portions of the effluent launders which is causing short circuiting of

secondary effluent. Launders and weirs are no longer providing an even discharge around the circumference of the clarifiers because of settling. In addition, algae build up is exacerbating these problems. Improvements to the final clarifiers will include either launder covers or brushes to mitigate algae growth on the weirs and launders. New peripheral feed systems and skirt baffles will be installed to distribute incoming activated sludge evenly around the secondary clarifier. These improvements are important for the WPCF's treatment capability because it directly affects their secondary effluent and will aid in preventing solids carry over.

Battery-B Grit Removal and Screening Improvements

The complete upgrade of the grit removal system with the addition of fine screening in Battery B would require demolition of old equipment and reconfiguration of the grit tanks and building. Effectiveness, Efficiency, and reliability are the desired outcome. The new system must provide protection of downstream equipment and processes from grit and debris carryover not currently captured by screening and the grit removal system, while reducing maintenance repair expenses and labor.

The preferred grit removal system is the Hydro-International Headcell with the Slurry Cup grit washer and the Grit Snail dewatering escalator. Grit tank modifications will be required. Other systems may be considered. The addition of fine screening for Battery B prior to grit removal must include a screenings washer and compactor. All of these upgrades will require reconfiguration of the Battery B grit building and load-out garage. Other upgrades include replacement of the Influent water pipe and Magmeter, evaluation and recommendations for repair or replacement of all process piping, gates, and valves. Concrete evaluation and repairs should also be included
