SPECIAL PUBLIC NOTICE - ELECTRONIC PUBLIC MEETING

On March 10, 2020, Governor Gretchen Whitmer declared a State of Emergency after two individuals were confirmed testing presumptively positive for COVID-19. On March 12, 2020, Mayor Sheldon A. Neeley declared a local State of Emergency to exist in the City of Flint as a result of the threat of COVID-19, and closed City Hall to the public effective March 17, 2020. On March 22, 2020, Mayor Neeley asked residents to participate in a voluntary shelter in place. On March 23, 2020, the City Council approved the continuation of the declaration of a local State of Emergency. On May 21, 2020, Governor Whitmer instituted Executive Order No. 2020-96 in order to reaffirm. clarify and extend the suspension of activities not necessary to sustain or protect life, and took immediate effect. On May 22, 2020, Governor Whitmer instituted Executive Order No. 2020-99, a Declaration of state of emergency and state of disaster related to the COVID-19 pandemic, which took immediate effect and rescinded EO No. 2020-67 and 2020-68. On March 18, 2020, Governor Whitmer instituted Executive Order No. 2020-15, a temporary authorization of remote participation in public meetings and hearings. Executive Order No. 2020-48, instituted April 14, 2020, clarified and extended the duration of that relief (and rescinded EO 2020-15). On May 6, 2020, Governor Whitmer instituted Executive Order No. 2020-75, which extends the duration of said relief further, and rescinds EO 2020-48. RESOLUTION TO ADOPT THE 2020 OPERATING MILLAGE RATE OF 19.1 MILLS TO BE LEVIED ON THE TAXABLE VALUATION OF ALL REAL AND PERSONAL PROPERTY LOCATED IN THE CITY OF FLINT

BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL:

The Flint City Council has determined, in accordance with the provisions of Section 7-201 of the Flint City Charter and Section 117.3(g) of the Home Rule City Act (MCL 117, Home Rule Cities), to levy Nineteen and Ten Hundredths (19.10) mills against the Taxable Valuation on all real and personal property appearing on the 2020 Assessment Roll of the City of Flint for the year 2020 as approved by the Board of Review and equalized through the constitutional and statutory processes of County and State Equalization; and

Section 7-201(A) of the Flint City Charter authorizes the levy of Ten and Zero Hundredths (10.00) mills on each dollar of Taxable Valuation of all real and personal property in the City, and further provides that Seven and Fifty Hundredths (7.50) mills of the 10.00 mills levied shall be for municipal purposes; and

Section 7-201(B) of the Flint City Charter provides that the remaining Two and Fifty Hundredths (2.50) mills of the 10.00 mills shall be utilized for the payment of bond obligations and/or public capital improvements; and

Section 7-201(A)(2) authorizes a levy of Fifty Hundredths (0.50) mill on the Taxable Valuation of all real and personal property in the City, with all revenues received being dedicated solely for the purpose of improvements and maintenance of City parks, forestry and recreation services; and

Section 7-201(A)(3) authorizes a levy of Sixty Hundredths mill (0.60) on the Taxable valuation of all real and personal property in the City, with all revenues received being dedicated to fund public transportation services in the City of Flint through the Mass Transportation Authority; and

Section 7-201(A)(4) authorizes a levy of Two and Zero Hundredths (2.00) mills on the Taxable Valuation of all real and personal property in the City, with all revenues received being dedicated for the sole purpose of providing police services; and

Section 7-201(A)(5) authorizes a levy of Six and Zero Hundredths (6.00) mills on the Taxable Valuation of all real and personal property in the City, with all revenues received being used solely for the purpose of providing police and fire protection.

IT IS RESOLVED that there shall be levied against every dollar of all taxable property appearing on the 2020 Assessment Rolls of the City of Flint, through the constitutional and statutory processes of County and State Equalization, a total of Nineteen and Ten Hundredths (19.10) mills of which Seven and Fifty Hundredths (7.50) mills shall be for General City Operating Purposes; Two and Fifty Hundredths (2.50) mills shall be for retirement of debt, improvements and other purposes as provided in Section 7-201 of the Flint City Charter, as amended; Two and Zero Hundredths (2.00) mills shall be for Police Services; Fifty Hundredths

(0.50) mill shall be for the purpose of improvements and maintenance of City parks, forestry and recreation services; Sixty Hundredths (0.60) mill shall be for the purpose of funding public transportation services in the City by the Mass Transportation Authority; and, Six and Zero Hundredths (6.0) mills shall be for Police and Fire Services.

RESOLUTION TO ASSESS STREET LIGHTING COSTS FOR FY2021

BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL:

Whereas, the City's General Fund cannot support the cost of operating, maintaining, and improving City street lighting. The provision of street lighting provides essential benefits with respect to the public safety and welfare of the City, its residents, and property owners. If the City stopped providing street lighting, it follows that crime would increase; the fear of crime would increase; there would be more accidents; and the quality of life and value of property would suffer; and

Whereas, the City has authority to specially assess for the cost of operating, maintaining, and improving street lighting under the Home Rule City Act, Act 279, Michigan Public Acts of 1909, as amended, MCL 117.1 et seq.; and

Whereas, pursuant to Emergency Manager Order No. 32, adopted June 27, 2012, a special assessment district was established for street lighting.

Whereas, the Chief Financial Officer has caused to be prepared plans and cost estimates for the continued provision of street lighting.

Whereas, the FY2020/21 budget contains an expenditure appropriation of \$2,834,452 for street lighting. There are estimated to be 40,402 parcels in the City subject to this assessment. The collection rate is estimated to be 70%. The cost of operating, maintaining, and improving street lighting will be spread equally to all parcels in the City, since all property owners benefit from a well-lit city. The fee charged per parcel will be \$100.22. This is a decrease of \$9.45 from FY 2019/2020.

THEREFORE, BE IT IS RESOLVED that effective July 1, 2020, the cost of operating, maintaining, and improving street lighting, as contemplated under MCL 117.4d, shall be assessed against the special lighting district to provide for the operational costs of the current system, and to enable upgrades and improvements to street lighting throughout the City. The assessment will be collected through the property tax bill for all property owners. The amount to be assessed will be adjusted annually to reflect the projected cost for the operational, maintenance and improvement costs, and the number of property owners.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the cost per parcel for the July 2020 tax bill will be set at \$100.22 per parcel.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all funds shall be used exclusively for the purpose intended – for the payment of costs permitted under MCL 117.4d(2)(b), including engineering, financial, legal, administrative services, and operation and maintenance of the City street lighting system.

RESOLUTION TO SET A USER FEE FOR MUNICIPAL SOLID WASTE COSTS FOR FY2021

BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL:

Whereas, the City's General Fund cannot support and subsidize the cost of solid waste collection and disposal. The provision of solid waste collection and disposal provides essential benefits with respect to the health, welfare, and public safety of the City, its residents, and property owners. If the City stopped providing solid waste collection and disposal services health issues would arise and there a loss of quality of life and the value of property would suffer; and

Whereas, the City has authority to collect a user fee for the cost of waste collection, disposal and related activities under the Home Rule City Act, Michigan Public Acts of 1909 as amended, MCL 117.1 et seq. and the Revenue Bond Act of 1933, Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan 1933, as amended, MCL 141.101 et seq..; and

Whereas, pursuant to Emergency Manager Order No. 28 – Brown and Emergency Manager Order No. 21 – Earley, the special 3 mill levy for waste collection was discontinued effective July 1, 2012 and a user fee structure was established based solely on costs associated with the City's waste management plan, to include waste collection, disposal and related activities and shall be proportionate to the underlying cost of the service; and

Whereas, the user fee shall be charged to residential and multi-family dwellings up to four units, and the charge shall be based on the number of units and the charge shall be placed on the tax bill; and

Whereas, commercial and industrial properties will not be charged, as they do not receive waste collection service from the City; and

Whereas, the Acting Chief Financial Officer has caused to be prepared plans and cost estimates for the continued provision of solid waste collection and disposal along with associated costs; and

Whereas, the FY2020/21 budget contains an expenditure appropriation of \$5,228,905.00 for solid waste collection, disposal and associated costs. There are estimated to be 33,141 parcels in the City subject to this user charge. The City is anticipating a net 30% reduction in gross collections. The cost of the City's solid waste collection and disposal program along with all supporting costs shall be spread equally to all residential and multi-family dwellings. The charge established shall be \$206.94. This is an increase of \$39.47.

THEREFORE, BE IT IS RESOLVED that effective July 1, 2020, the cost of collecting, disposing and City related operating, maintenance and collection activities as contemplated under MCL 117.1 et seq and MCL 141.101 et seq., shall be charged to each residential and multi-family dwellings up to four units; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED effective July 1, 2020, the user fee shall be \$206.94 to be charged to residential and multi-family dwellings up to four units, and the charge shall be calculated on the number of units and the charge shall be placed on the July 2020 tax bill; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that commercial and industrial properties will not be charged as they do not receive waste collection services from the City; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all funds shall be used exclusively for the purpose intended – for the payment of costs permitted under MCL 117.1 et seq., and the Revenue Bond Act of 1933, Act 94 as amended MCL 141.101 et seq. including collection, disposal, legal and administrative services associated and appropriated for in the City's Garbage Collection Special Revenue Fund.

JOINT RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND THE FLINT CITY COUNCIL DECLARING RACISM AS A PUBLIC HEALTH CRISIS

BY THE MAYOR AND THE CITY COUNCIL:

WHEREAS, racism is a system of structuring opportunity and assigning value based on race¹; and

WHEREAS, racism unfairly disadvantages specific individuals and communities, while unfairly giving advantages to other individuals and communities.² The system of racism undermines the realization of the full potential of our whole society through the waste of human resources,³ and the City of Flint's collective prosperity depends upon the equitable access to opportunity for every resident regardless of the color of their skin; and

WHEREAS, racism causes persistent discrimination and disparate outcomes in many areas of life, including housing, education, employment and criminal justice; and an emerging body of research demonstrates that racism itself is a social determinant of health⁴; and

WHEREAS, According to Black Enterprise, as of April 2020, the U.S. economy lost 20.5 million jobs, and the unemployment rate for African American workers doubled to 16.7%, the highest rate since 2010. The coronavirus pandemic hit African Americans and Latinos harder than any other race.⁵ In April 2020, the Michigan Unemployment Rate was 22.7%, up from 4.3% in March 2020. African Americans in Flint experience poverty at a rate of 43.66%

WHEREAS, the City is committed to the elimination of racial disparities in the criminal justice system, to prioritize racial equity in our decision making processes, to acknowledge that communities of color have borne the burdens of inequitable social, environmental, economic, and criminal justice policies practices and investments, to understand that the legacy of these inequitable policies has caused deep disparities, harm, and mistrust, and to recognize that racial equity is realized when and only when race can no longer be used to predict life outcomes; and

WHEREAS, according to the 2017 Michigan BRFS Estimates, 21.3% African-Americans (Black) between the ages of 18-49 had fair or poor general health and 39.5% those age 50 or older had fair or poor general health, while 12% of Caucasian (White) between the ages of 18-49 had fair or poor general health and 20.8% of those age 50 or older had fair or poor general health. 24.9% of African-Americans (Black) males' general health was fair or poor and 32.6% of females general health was fair or poor, while 16.7% of Caucasian (White) males general health was fair or poor and 16.7% of females general health was fair or poor. 36.2% of African-Americans (Black) with a high school education or less general health had fair or poor general health and 21.1% those with some college or more had fair or poor general health, while 24.0% of Caucasian (White) with a high school education or less general health had fair or poor general health and 12% of those with some college or more had fair or poor general health. 38.5% of African-Americans (Black) with household income of \$35,000 or less general health had fair or poor general health and 14.8% of those with household income of \$35,000 or more had health was fair or poor general health, while 30% of Caucasian (White) with household income of \$35,000 or less general health had fair or poor general health and 10.1% of those with household income of \$35,000 or more had fair or poor general health, demonstrating the disparity in health; and

WHEREAS, a contemporary example of such disparity is highlighted by the coronavirus data. According to the Michigan Coronavirus website, African American's made up 31% of the State of Michigan's overall confirmed cases and 40% of deceased cases that suggest African Americans are dying at a disproportionately higher rate from the disease; and

WHEREAS, more than 100 studies have linked racism to worse health outcomes⁸; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and the City Councilmembers stands with the residents of Flint in their declaration of racism as a public health crisis.

IT IS RESOLVED that the Mayor and the Flint City Council do all things necessary and declare racist a public health crisis affecting Flint, Michigan, the United States of American and the world.

IT IS RESOLVED that the Mayor and the Flint City Council do all things necessary work to progress antiracism principles across the City of Flint, its leadership, staffing, contracting, public servants and its community.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor and the Flint City Council do all things necessary promote equity through all policies approved by the Flint City Council and enhance educational efforts aimed at understanding, addressing and dismantling racism and how it affects the delivery of human and social services, economic development and public safety.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor and the Flint City Council do all things necessary continue to advocate locally and throughout the City, County, the State of Michigan and the Country for relevant policies that improve health in communities of color, and supports local, state, regional, and federal initiatives that advance efforts to dismantle systemic racism.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor and the Flint City Council do all things necessary to further work to solidify alliances and partnerships with other organizations that are confronting racism and encourage other local, state, regional and national entities to recognize racism as a public health crisis and to support community efforts to amplify issues of racism and engage actively and authentically with communities of color wherever they live.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor and the Flint City Council do all things necessary to promote and support policies that prioritize the health of all people, especially people of color by mitigating exposure to adverse childhood experiences.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor and the Flint City Council do all things necessary and implement racial equity training with the goal of reaching all and encourage racial equity training among all community partners, grantees, vendors and contractors.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor and the Flint City Council do all things necessary identify clear goals and objectives, to assess progress and capitalize on

opportunities to further advance racial equity; and

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor and the Flint City Council do all things necessary to supports all additional efforts in the City of Flint, Genesee County, the State of Michigan, and nationwide to address racism and public health disparities due to racial inequities; and,

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor and the Flint City Council do all things necessary to call upon the Governor, the Speaker of the Michigan House, and the Michigan Senate President to join with us to declare racism as a public health crisis and to enact equity in all policies of the state of Michigan.

RESOLUTION DENOUCING THE USE OF ILLEGAL RESTRAINT METHODS (USE OF KNEE ON THE NECK, CHOKEHOLD AND OTHER IMPROPER METHODS) AND ZERO TOLERANCE

BY THE MAYOR AND THE CITY COUNCIL:

WHEREAS, on May 25, 2020, George Floyd, an African-American man died because a Minneapolis, Minnesota police officer knelt on Mr. Floyd's neck, while Mr. Floyd was handcuffed, lying on the ground, and begging to breathe, while other Minneapolis police officers failed to intervene; and

WHEREAS, the shocking death of Mr. Floyd and similar acts that have occurred in recent years further exacerbated the relationship between communities and their police departments; and

WHEREAS, the senseless death of Mr. Floyd and similar acts that have occurred in recent years degrade the fundamental human rights of equality, dignity, and respect that the City of Flint holds dear; and

WHEREAS, the unwarranted death of Mr. Floyd and similar acts that have occurred in recent years have inspired protests and demonstrations in cities across our nation, including our own; and

WHEREAS, those protests and demonstrations represent declarations of sorrow, disbelief, and anger from communities whose voices have for too long been marginalized and ignored.

WHEREAS, the actions of those Minneapolis police officers, and similar acts that have occurred in recent years, do not represent the dedicated service of tens of thousands of men and women who serve and protect their communities with professionalism, distinction, and valor – as do the officers of our own Flint Police Department; and

IT IS THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Mayor and City Council join with America in expressing their sorrow, disbelief, and anger at the death of Mr. Floyd and similar acts that have occurred in recent years.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor and City Council fully supports the peaceful public expression of those concerns by the residents of the City of Flint and their participation in the ongoing and necessary public dialogue on these issues.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor and City Council commits to the Flint community that the City of Flint does not and will not tolerate violent treatment of others – or failing to intervene in such situations – that degrades or otherwise compromises the fundamental human rights of equality, dignity, and respect that we collectively hold dear.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the use of illegal tactics such as the use of knee on the neck, chokehold and other illegal methods to restrain individuals will not be used or tolerated.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor and City Council expects and requires that the Flint Police Department will review their policies, practices, and procedures to ensure that those policies, practices and procedures are in accordance with this resolution.

ORDINANCE NO.	
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An Ordinance to amend the Flint City Code of Ordinances by amending Chapter 31, General Offenses; Article I, In General.

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF FLINT:

Sec. 1. An Ordinance to amend the Flint City Code of Ordinances by amending Chapter 31, General Offenses; Article I, by the addition of Section 31-19.8 Bias Crime Reporting which shall read in its entirety as follows:

§ 31-19.8 Bias Crime Reporting.

- (A) DEFINITIONS: THE DEFINITIONS AND PROVISIONS CONTAINED IN THIS SECTION SHALL GOVERN THE CONSTRUCTION, MEANING, AND APPLICATION OF THE FOLLOWING WORDS AND PHRASES USED IN THIS CHAPTER. GOVERN THE CONSTRUCTION, MEANING, AND APPLICATION OF THE FOLLOWING WORDS AND PHRASES USED IN THIS CHAPTER.
 - 1. PROTECTED CLASS MEANS RACE, COLOR, CREED, RELIGION, ANCESTRY, NATIONAL ORIGIN, SEX, DISABILITY, AGE, MARITAL STATUS, STATUS WITH REGARD TO PUBLIC ASSISTANCE, SEXUAL ORIENTATION, GENDER IDENTITY, GENDER EXPRESSION, AND VETERAN STATUS.
 - 2. DISABILITY MEANS A
 PHYSICAL OR MENTAL
 IMPAIRMENT THAT
 SUBSTANTIALLY LIMITS ONE

- OR MORE MAJOR LIFE
 ACTIVITIES, INCLUDING THE
 FUNCTIONS OF CARING FOR
 ONE'S SELF, PERFORMING,
 MANUAL TASKS, WALKING,
 SEEING, HEARING, SPEAKING,
 BREATHING, LEARNING, AND
 WORKING; A RECORD OF A
 PHYSICAL OR MENTAL
 IMPAIRMENT; OR BEING
 REGARDED AS HAVING A
 PHYSICAL OR MENTAL
 IMPAIRMENT.
- 3. GENDER EXPRESSION MEANS
 THE PRESENTATION OF AN
 INDIVIDUAL INCLUDING
 PHYSICAL APPEARANCE,
 CLOTHING CHOICE AND
 ACCESSORIES, AND
 BEHAVIORS THAT EXPRESS
 ASPECTS OF GENDER
 IDENTITY OR ROLE, GENDER
 EXPRESSION MAY OR MAY
 NOT CONFORM TO A
 PERSON'S GENDER IDENTITY.
- 4. GENDER IDENTITY MEANS A PERSON'S ACTUAL OR PERCEIVED GENDER-RELATED ATRIBUTES, SELF-IMAGE, APPEARANCE, EXPRESSION, OR BEHAVIOR, WHETHER OR NOT SUCH CHARATERISTICS DIFFER FROM THOSE TRADITIONALLY ASSOCIATED WITH THE PERSON'S ASSIGNED SEX AT BIRTH.
- 5. SEX MEANS MALE OR FEMALE. THE TERMS "BECAUSE OF SEX" AND "ON THE BASIS OF SEX" INCLUDE PREGNANCY, ANY ILLNESS ARISING OUT OF AND OCCURRING DURING THE

- COURSE OF A PREGNANCY, CHILDBIRTH, OR RELATED MEDICAL CONDITIONS.
- 6. SEXUAL ORIENATION MEANS A COMPONENT OF AN INDIVIDUAL'S IDENITTY THAT INCLUDES A PERSON'S SEXUAL AND EMOTIONAL ATTRACTION TO ANOTHER PERSON AND THE BEHAVIOR AND/OR SOCIAL AFFILIATION WHICH MAY RESULT FROM THIS ATTRACTION AND INCLUDES A LESBIAN WOMAN, GAY MALE, BISEXUAL PERSON OR HETEROSEXUAL PERSON.
- 7. VETERAN STATUS MEANS (A)
 A VETERAN OF THE ARMED
 FORCES OF THE UNITED
 STATES; (B) A MEMBER OF
 THE MICHIGAN NATIONAL
 GUARD; OR (C) A MEMBER OF
 A RESERVE COMPONENT.
- **(B)** NO PERSON SHALL KNOWINGLY OR RECKLESSY REPORT TO A CITY OF FLINT POLICE OFFICER, CITY OF FLINT DISPATCHER, OR OTHER CITY OF FLINT PERSONNEL THAT AN INDIVIDUAL WHO IS AN ACTUAL OR PERCEIVED MEMBER OF A PROTECTED **CLASS** COMMITTED, OR MAY OR WILL **SUCH** COMMIT. A CRIME, IF REPORT IS BASED IN WHOLE OR IN PART ON THE INDIVIDUAL'S MEMBERSHIP IN A PROTECTED CLASS AND NOT ON A REASONABLE SUSPICION OF CRIMINAL ACTIVITY CONSIDERATION OF ALL AVAILABLE FACTS AND THE TOTALITY OF THE CIRCUMSTNACES.
- (C) ANY PERSON WHO VIOLATES THIS CHAPTER IS GUILTY OF A

MISDEMEANOR, PUNISHABLE BY A FINE OF NOT MORE THAN \$500 AND/OR IMPRISONMENT UP TO 90 DAYS AND MUST COMPLETE COURT ORDERED BIAS TRAINING.
