For the program year ending June 30, 2017, the City of Flint received entitlement funds of \$3,563,724 in CDBG, \$684,250 in HOME and \$632,144 in ESG. In order to meet the goals and objectives of the 5-year Consolidated Plan, these funds were awarded to eligible subrecipient organization including non-profit and City of Flint departments. Eligible non-profit organizations were awarded contracts to implement public service and housing activities designed to benefit the entire community. In the public service funding, priority was given to programs that focused on youth initiatives, fair housing and small business counseling. Rehabilitation and acquisition projects focused on city-wide emergency, owner occupied rehabilitation and the acquisition of multi-unit apartment developments. Additional resources were allocated to the Genesee County Land Bank and the City Blight Division to address blighted properties in accordance with the City's Blight Elimination Framework and Master Plan. The the Continuum of Care and subrecipients, the City continues to address at risk youth, homelessness prevention, rapid rehousing and shelter operations and essential services.

The City continues to focus on low to moderate income residents by focusing in accordance with the strategic goals of the 5-year Consolidated Plan. The City continues to provide funding priority to subrecipient agencies that serve youth and seniors with recreational and educational services designed to enrich and satisfy needs. The City assisted developers in the acquisition of multi-family unit affordable housing, emergency repairs and owner occupied rehabilitation to stabilize vulnerable neighborhoods and to create housing opportunities. The Blight Elimination Framework continues to be a resource when determining how to best address slum and blight.

Narrative

The City identified Local Target Areas (North Saginaw Area, the Full Choice Area, and the Pierson Road Corridor Area) and is in the process of obtaining its NRSA designation for the Choice Neighborhoods geographic area. These sub-areas were created as a complementary component to the Imagine Flint Master Plan. Community engagement was the cornerstone of Imagine Flint, and more than 5,000 people participated in the nearly 300 outreach events throughout the planning process. The sub-area plan repesents a clear and detailed listing identified by the residents in the sub-areas. The areas selected were also identified through research, data collection and analysis, citizen participation including the City Council. Each of these areas meet the eligibility requirements for low-moderate income benefit. In program year 18 projects within these designation will couple the Choice projects.

Leveraging

Explain how federal funds leveraged additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements were satisfied, as well as how any publicly owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that were used to address the needs identified in the plan.

The City was successful in its application for Choice Neighborhoods Implemenation grant and was awarded 30 million. The City plans to leverage these funds with strategic projects in the NRSA designated area. Additional CDBG leveraging will include, funding from State and Federal grant sources, City Departments (e.g. Public Works, Parks and Recreation), public or social service providers, and other sources.

Discuss the difference between goals and outcomes and problems encountered in meeting these goals.

Projects that had been identified were not at the shovel ready stage when funded and additional documentation was required to enter into a commitment at the time the release of funds was received. The HOME projects funded out of the 17-18 year are expected to progress to completion once all HUD required documentation is received. As for CDBG, the Owner Occupied Rehab project is making progress towards expending all 17-18 funds, yet has encountered difficulty with identifying those that meet income guidelines, but that are also in good standing with the City of Flint for utilities and taxes. The City

Wide Emergency home repair program underwent several major staffing changes, directly impacting the program. Those items, combined with the difficulty in identifying qualified participants, had a direct impact on the number of housholds assisted. The funds that were awarded to the agency addressing the special needs population declined their funds, thus there was no program targeting that population as was indicated.

The numbers of actual assisted units reflected is reflective only of those projects that are completed at the time the year end. This was an acquisition of an affordable housing development from the Michigan State Housing Development Authority by a local non-profit developer (HOME), along with the Owner Occupied Rehab and the City Wide Emergency Programs (CDBG).

Discuss how these outcomes will impact future annual action plans.

These outcomes will impact future annual action plans through the identification of more shovel ready projects that will provide a more immediate impact on the availability of decent, safe, affordable housing within the City of Flint. Awarding funds to those agencies that have difficulty in implementing their identified programs will be addressed through a better and more thorough underwriting and risk analysis process that will help to identify issues early on, which will then be taken into account in awarding funds. Ensuring that agencies have a realistic understanding of the process and the requirements after the award will assist in ensuring a more accurate account of the number of housing units and households assisted will be paramount.

Narrative Information

The City is committed to identifying more shovel ready projects to direct a more immediate impact on the availability of decent, safe, affordable housing for its residents. This will be accomplished through

following the already identified City of Flint policies and procedures, as well as those requirements as outlined by HUD. Constant contact with funded agencies to address any issues encountered as projects progress is necessary to accomplish timely completion of projects be it large scale development or owner occupied repair programs. As the housing market continues to evolve in the City staying abreast of the needs of the population is paramount. The City will continue to focus on a housing strategy that fits the needs of the City's residents and provide housing stock for future growth.

CR-25 - Homeless and Other Special Needs 91.220(d, e); 91.320(d, e); 91.520(c)

Evaluate the jurisdiction's progress in meeting its specific objectives for reducing and ending homelessness through:

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

In August of 2018, The Flint/Genesee Continuum of Care (CoC) updated its 10-Year Plan to End Homelessness. Though the CoC is a county-wide collaborative, Metro Community Development is the lead agency. The Genesee Homeless Awareness Task Force is responsible for collecting homeless data, conducting homeless needs assessments, Point in Time Counts, and developing community supported homeless strategies to end homelessness in the Flint/Genesee County area.

The Continuum of Care has several committees that work together on projects designed to end homelessness in Flint/Genesee County. In addition to the Genesee County Homeless Awareness Task Force, there is the Committee Concerned with Housing as well as the Project Homeless Connect Planning Committee. These committees are more fully described in the Strategic Plan section of the 5 year Consolidated Plan. The City used funds to support and expand the supply of affordable housing options to assist low-income households retain their homes and provide emergency, transitional and permanent supportive housing units for homeless and/or at-risk individuals, families, veterans, children and youth.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The Flint/Genesee Continuum of Care (CoC) is the primary method for addressing emergency shelter and transitional needs of homeless individuals and families in the City of Flint. The CoC is a collaborative effort designed to identify existing resources in the community, eliminate duplication, develop seamless housing/homeless related services, insure leveraging of mainstream and private sector resources, and maximize community partnerships.

The 10-year plan referenced above defines the scope of the problem using national and local data and research based upon how people are impacted, systemic contributions to homelessness, infrastructure issues, historical response, and lack of coordination and resources. The approach is three fold: to promote community change related to the consciousness and perception of homelessness; to provide safe, secure, accessible and affordable housing to all persons in Genesee County regardless of age, race, gender, sexual preference, disability, or familial status; and to organize a comprehensive and interconnected network of advocacy, no wrong door, and wrap around services aimed at eliminated the cycle of homelessness. During past year the CoC has also adopted a coordinated entry process to further eliminate duplication of services.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely

low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

According to the 2011-2015 American Community Survey there are approximately 41,118 (41.2%) Flint residents with incomes below the poverty level. Earning a living wage is instrumental in preventing homelessness. This coupled with a lack of affordable permanent housing and discrimination in rent and lending practices puts the minority population in a particularly precarious situation with regard to the threat of becoming homeless.

For extremely low-income renters with children, supportive services such as quality affordable housing, funds for rent/utility arrearages, life skills, employment training and placement services, childcare, and transportation are critical to their ability to stay in permanent housing and to avoid becoming homeless. The City of Flint will support the CoC in homeless prevention through Asset Building. The CoC aims to empower and encourage families to acquire and preserve assets, including a safe, decent, and affordable home, and achieve long-term financial success. This will be done through three specific goals:

- Educate families about housing choices.
- Empower families to access their housing choices.
- Preserve and expand quality, affordable housing opportunities.

The City of Flint is working cooperatively with area homeless services providers to address needs and take necessary actions to assist homeless persons and families. The CoC provide both transitional and permanent supportive housing services to homeless and at risk persons and families as they work towards independent living. Three sources of Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing funds granted to the City of Flint, Genesee County, and MSHDA assist individuals and families who are at-risk of becoming homeless. In addition, several agencies in the City of Flint, working through the Continuum of Care were awarded Shelter Plus Care funds and Supportive Housing Program funds for activities to assist the homeless population in Flint and Genesee County.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The goal of ending chronic homelessness was approached through the dual strategy of affordable housing and supportive services. The Flint/Genesee County Continuum of Care has a number of sources of permanent housing placement for the homeless in the Flint/Genesee County area. Permanent Housing for homeless persons or families is long-term and safe, decent, and affordable. It is generally community based, private market housing designed to enable the homeless person or family to live as independently as possible in a permanent setting.

However, it may include projects specifically developed for homeless individuals and families. This includes housing units available to the broader community and may or may not be subsidized. Such housing may be combined with the provision of supportive services provided by the organization managing the housing or coordinated by the applicant and provided by other public or private service agencies.

When services are combined with housing, the project is referred to as permanent supportive housing, which is generally provided to homeless persons with disabilities, primarily serving individuals and members of their household who have serious mental illnesses, chronic substance abuse problems, physical disabilities, or AIDS and related diseases. Supportive services are provided on site or coordinated through partnering agencies. Rental subsidies are encouraged but not always available. Rent is generally based on a percentage of the household income. Permanent supportive housing enables special needs populations to live as independently as possible in a permanent setting and can be provided in multi-family structures or scattered site apartments.

When possible, the City of Flint will continue to support organizations that provide permanent housing.

CR-30 - Public Housing 91.220(h); 91.320(j)

Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

Through the Choice Neighborhoods (CN) program, the City has been supporting the Flint Housing Commission (FHC) in developing a demolition strategy which would lead to available land for utilization by a developer in tandem with the Department of Housing and Urban Development's Implementation grant. This action supports the Flint Housing Commission in advancing its family home ownership and self-sufficiency program.

In addition, the City has funded a community outreach police officer that works within the southside neighborhood boundaries with residents to address safety concerns for youth, parents, and elderly. The goal of the Community Officer is to create neighborhood partnerships between residents and business owners in the South Flint area to engage residents in problem solving exercises to proactively address immediate conditions that give rise to public safety issues.

The mission of the FHC is to provide the Flint community with quality, affordable housing that is decent, well maintained, and free from drugs and violent crime. The mission is supported by key objectives that include: building livable communities composed of a diverse range of incomes; creating an environment that will nurture and support strong parental roles that demonstrate increased self-sufficiency and lead to economic gains for families. The FHC has future goals to demolish approximately 72 Scattered Site properties that are in disrepair and updating as many as possible of the remaining Scattered Housing Sites. This will help remove some of the blight in many neighborhoods in the City of Flint. The FHC is also in the final stages of adopting their Energy Performance Contract. In the past two years, several energy efficient updates have been successfully installed. These include EnergyEfficient Windows, Energy Efficient Lighting, Hot Water Heaters and a Green Roof.

Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The City of Flint continues to work cooperatively with the Flint Housing Commission. The Choice Neighborhoods (CN) planning grant awarded in January 2015 allows the two entities (FHC & COF) to work together to create a plan for improved services and housing in South Flint. The target public housing development in Flint is Atherton East. The CN team has been working over the past two years with residents of Atherton East and the broader South Flint community, crafting a vision by choosing immediate and long-term projects to improve the overall quality of life within the project area. The plan was submitted to HUD in July of 2016, and HUD has approved the transformation plan. The City submitted a Choice Neighborhood application in November, 2017. Recently, it was announced that the City of Flint has been awarded the \$30 million dollar Choice Neighborhoods Implementation Grant. Moving forward, The City will continue to work in partnership with Atherton East staff, residents, and the developer, Norstar Development, USA on Phase I of the housing plan, with construction projected to begin by February 2019. An informed draft relocation plan has been established with input of the 100

residents and families residing in Atherton East, with outreach being an ongoing effort as the project moves forward.

Actions taken to provide assistance to troubled PHAs

Most recently, the FHC was assessed in January of 2014, receiving an improved score of 68 through the HUD Public Housing Assessment System. FHC was upgraded from "troubled" status to a designation as "substandard management". Over the course of the year, the City intends to continue its support of the Flint Housing Commission, particularly through the Choice Neighborhoods Program, but also when opportunities become available to coordinate resources, enhance neighborhood safety, and provide technical assistance.

CR-35 - Other Actions 91.220(j)-(k); 91.320(i)-(j)

Actions taken to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment. 91.220 (j); 91.320 (i)

The opportunity that exists for Flint is to be at the forefront of sustainable housing development that integrates green space for recreation and gardening into the urban fabric, creation of equitable policies that encourage economic and racial integration, and 21st century infrastructure whose lessons are not forgotten by future politicians' fiscal planning is urgent and crucial. In 2016, with these things in mind, the City of Flint's Community and Economic Development division created and adopted a housing investment strategy meant to guide the investment of the City of Flint's limited funds for housing (primarily HOME but also some CDBG) to incentivize projects that meet these criteria and create an ecosystem for other similar investments both by nonprofit and for profit developers. This housing investment strategy encompasses many of the goals listed in the Housing and Neighborhoods Implementation Matrix located within the City of Flint Master Plan. It primarily focuses on allocating federal resources for affordable housing development, but also incorporates strategies and programs that support residents remaining in their homes, as well as assisting low-and-moderate income households achieve homeownership through the establishment of an affordable housing revolving loan fund that can be used for acquisition and renovation financing. These strategies will never fully eliminate the political, regulatory, development, and financial barriers to affordable housing but the City of Flint is taking deliberate steps toward increasing the opportunities and improving the city's ability to leverage funds and energy to maximize impact.

Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

Priorities for funding in the Consolidated Plan were determined by many sources of public input. One of the primary sources was the *Imagine Flint Master Plan* which convened over 5000 people over a period of two years and culminated in the development of a comprehensive place-based plan addressing far more than land use.

The City continues to seek additional funding resources to address the significant gap in available resources. It is critical for the City of Flint to receive additional financial support to mitigate the impact of the Flint Water Crisis which was caused by decisions made by the State Government and State Government-appointed Emergency Manager. Funds are needed to not only replace over \$1 billion worth of infrastructure but also to assist over 20,000 Flint youth whose developmental abilities are the most adversely impacted by lead poisoning.

Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

As of June 2009 the state of Michigan designated six high risk zip codes within the City for childhood

lead poisoning: 48502, 48503, 48504, 48505, 48506 and 48507. The City's homeownership and rehabilitation activities target low to moderate income households. The City of Flint will ensure that all of its federally funded housing programs are in full compliance with the lead-based paint hazard regulations (24 CFR Part 35). This includes directing households to the appropriate resources for lead paint inspection, testing, and abatement of lead-based hazards primarily the current state of Michigan HHS Lead Free Home Program. Funding allocations are still being used to provide lead abatement and mitigation services to help eliminate exposure to lead poisoning.

The City's homeownership and rehabilitation activities target low to moderate income households. The City of Flint will ensure that all of its federally funded housing programs are in full compliance with the lead-based paint hazard regulations (24 CFR Part 35). This includes assisting households with the appropriate lead paint inspection, testing, and abatement of lead-based hazards. Funding was used to provide lead abatement and mitigation services to help eliminate exposure to lead poisoning.

Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Flint acknowledges the need to address poverty throughout the community. According to the 2011-2015 ACS, the percentage of individuals in poverty within the City of Flint is 41.2%.

The City will seek to reduce the number of families that are below the poverty line. Flint will pursue the following strategies to reduce the number of poverty level families:

- Provide financial support to organizations offering necessary services, such as food, senior services, and counseling programs for extremely low-income persons.
- Continue to provide assistance to extremely low-income households in the improvement of their residences through the City's CDBG-funded Housing Rehabilitation.
- Provide homeownership programs to support homeownership and the accumulation of equity.
- Lead-based paint abatement to address child lead poisoning, which can affect future employment and earning capabilities.
- Fund infrastructure improvements (street, water main, sidewalk, etc.) to enhance neighborhoods and increase property values, while raising the pride of the residents as well as encouraging the introduction of economic development into distressed and impoverished areas.
- Provide financial support to organizations, which provide referrals to special needs persons, such as the Community Action Agency.
- Continue to work with the State of Michigan in the replacement of lead water leads that have caused a higher level of lead within drinking water.
- Economic development programs aimed at developing job training and employability skills.
- Support youth and childcare programs, which provide mentoring and role models for children, and additionally helps parents secure and keep employment.

Through HUD's Section 3 program, the City of Flint and the FHC also facilitates local economic development in concert with implementation of various public and affordable housing initiatives. Under

Section 3, recipients of certain HUD financial assistance must provide job training, employment, and contract opportunities for low- or very low-income residents to the greatest extent possible, in connection with projects and activities in their neighborhoods.

The City of Flint will coordinate this strategies with organizations providing affordable housing programs and other services through regular communication with other public agencies and non-profit organizations. The objective of this communication is to facilitate the coordination of policies and programs, which will lead to the reduction in the number of poverty-level families in Flint.

Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Flint has a fairly well developed institutional structure. The structure includes organizations from several backgrounds and represent private firms, local, nonprofit agencies and local and state agencies.

The support of public, private and non-profit organizations is particularly important, and collaborating with them continues to be the focus of the institutional approach to meeting the needs identified in this plan.

The Flint Housing Commission, the local Public Housing Authority, will continue to provide assistance to renter households through its public housing and Section 8 programs. Additionally, the Housing Commission provides necessary support services to renters including elderly renters, when available.

The lead agency for institutional delivery is the City of Flint Planning and Development Department, along with other City divisions and departments. These divisions and departments carryout objectives related to housing and community development. Furthermore, there are multiple nonprofit organizations that provide a range of public services, from programs to reduce homelessness to programs for non-homeless special needs populations. The Flint/Genesee County Continuum of Care (CoC) is a federally mandated body of homeless service providers. The CoC works in partnership with the Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA) and the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) towards the common goal to end homelessness in the United States within 10 years. Each year the Flint/Genesee County CoC applies for funding to support local efforts to prevent and end homelessness.

Local public institutions of special importance include the State of Michigan, particularly the Michigan State Housing Development Agency (MSHDA). MSHDA provides an important support vehicle through both funding and direct technical assistance. In addition, coordination with Genesee County Government is important on a number of levels. The County provides a number of services through the Genesee County Metropolitan Planning Commission, Genesee County Land Bank, Genesee County Department of Human Services, Genesee County Community Mental Health Department, and Genesee County Youth Corporation. Continued coordination with Genesee County and these departments will be important through the Consolidated Plan term through the leveraging of resources, ideas, and

services. An area which will be particularly important for coordination in the upcoming years is the requirement to partner with both the County and the Flint Housing Commission on a regional Assessment of Fair Housing (AFH).

The City of Flint has a strong Institutional delivery system. A wide range of services are available in the community, including homelessness prevention services, supportive services, and other services such as nutrition programs and youth programs. These programs are provided by nonprofit organizations and the Continuum of Care (CoC).

Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

Each year, as a part of the CDBG application planning process, local agencies and organizations are invited to submit proposals for CDBG eligible activities. These groups participate in the consultation process by attending the public hearings, informational meetings, and completing survey forms. The City of Flint works with many agencies to enhance coordination, including local, state, and federal stakeholders. The City continues to expand its outreach efforts to ensure that non-traditional applicants are aware of and involved in the process. The City works closely with the Flint Housing Commission and hopes to secure a HUD Implementation Grant for the Choice Neighborhoods program, as well as to continue the partnership efforts initiated with the Choice program.

The City of Flint has many initiatives underway to continue the positive momentum gained with the adoption of the long overdue Imagine Flint Master Plan. The plan calls for action on many levels, and the Department of Planning and Development is organized so that those efforts can be seamlessly achieved. Over the course of the next year, the Department will continue to work with our residents, as well as other local, state, and federal partners to maximize efforts towards inclusion, equity, justice, and transparency.

In spite of demographic analyses that indicates race-based patterns of discrimination and segregation persisted into the new century, improvement has been evidenced in the area of rental housing. Genesee County still holds its unfortunate distinction as one of the most segregated areas in the country, and the most segregated in Michigan. In addition, demographics indicate segregation based upon disability is emerging as a fairness issue.

An area which will be particularly important for continued coordination is the requirement to partner with both the County and the Flint Housing Commission on a regional Assessment of Fair Housing (AFH). One such recommendation is to continue to conduct studies on fair housing related topics in an effort to discover barriers to fair housing. Examples of topics considered important include lending practices, transportation patterns, and affordable housing availability for persons with disabilities.

The City of Flint has adopted and continues to amend its policies and procedures in HOME, CDBG and in ESG through the ESG Primer. In addition to providing agencies with Standard Operating Procedures and detailed contract development packets and subrecipient agreements, the City of Flint will also be providing on-going technical assistance through monthly sub-recipient trainings on a variety of program topics. CED staff monitor compliance by way of desk monitoring or personal monitoring whichever is deemed necessary based on agency capacity.

The City requires subrecipients to solicit bids in a newspaper of general circulation. The notification itself encourages minority and women owned businesses to apply. The City of Flint has assembled information to begin a "minority" contractor list and is providing the list to its subrecipient agencies.
